Her work is driven by a social justice and feminist agenda. Her postgraduate training was in both Drama Therapy and in Applied Theatre and her work takes on a therapeutic approach in its process and delivery, offering the potential for change, empowerment and transformation. She also co-coordinates and co-delivers the 'On the Out' project that creatively engages with women post release from prison and in recovery living in the local York community and with young girls at risk of the criminal justice system.

This film was her first venture as a screenwriter and she was encouraged and mentored by Phyllida Lloyd after a long theatrical journey in the Donmar Shakespeare series where she played a prisoner playing roles such as Portia in Julius Caesar and Prince Hal in Henry IV. The film Herself premiered to rave reviews at the Sundance Film Festival and was the closing film for DIFF 2020, winning the Human Rights Film Award and an IFTA for Best Script in 2021. Clare is currently working on her next feature which she is set to direct in 2025. More of her work as a screen actor releases across Autumn of 2024.
